## Accessibility is:

the quality of being...

- 1. easy to approach, reach, enter, speak with, use, or understand;
- 2. usable, reachable, obtainable, etc;
- 3. suitable or adapted for use by people with disabilities.

## Accessibility is when: 🎤

A person with a disability can...



acquire the same information engage in the same interactions enjoy the same services

in an equally **effective**, equally **integrated** manner, with substantially equivalent **ease of use**.

... as a person without a disability.

Accessibility can be confused with *accommodation*, adaptation, assistive technology.

We need to think: "Is it accessible?"

To whom?
Under what conditions?
For which tasks?

## **Accessibile? Focus on:**

Accessible educational materials

materials in different format (print, digital, graphics, audio), designed or enhanced in a way that makes them usable across the widest range of needs, including learners with disabilities.

Accessible formats

audio, braille, large print, tactile graphics, and digital text conforming to accessibility standards

Accessible technologies

hardware or software are universally designed to set the accessibility in the settings. We can arrange views options, add accessible fonts, set up the audio input, and reduce motor requirements necessary to use the tools. The technologies are for all but customized according to customer's needs.


Assistive technologies text-to-speech tool, screen readers for visual impairments, speech recognition. Assistive technology reacts to a specific need. Nowadays the discourse focuses on the possibility to create digital tools designed for all at reasonable prices.
